Cabana wins AIAA Goddard Astronautics Award




AIAA has announced that Robert D. Cabana, Director of NASA Kennedy Space Center, and member of the Cape Canaveral Section of AIAA has been named recipient of the AIAA Goddard Astronautics Award for 2020. This is highest honor AIAA bestows for achievement in the field of astronautics. It was endowed

by Mrs. Goddard in the 1940s as the ARS Goddard Memorial Award to commemorate her husband, Robert H. Goddard—rocket visionary, pioneer, bold experimentalist, and superb engineer whose early liquid rocket engine launches set the stage for the development of astronautics. The award will be presented on May 20, 2020 at the AIAA Aerospace Spotlight Awards Gala, in Washington, DC.

The citation announcing the 2020 award, recognizes Robert D. Cabana “for significant leadership and reinvention of the Kennedy Space Center into the world’s preeminent multiuser spaceport supporting government and commercial access to space.” Mr. Cabana is a former NASA astronaut who flew on four Space Shuttle missions, and has been inducted into the Astronaut Hall of Fame. He is also a graduate of the US Naval Academy, serving as a naval flight officer and naval aviator in the US Marine Corps, logging over 7,000 hours in 50 different types of aircraft.

Mr. Cabana has received numerous personal awards and decorations over the years, including the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Presidential Distinguished Rank Award, and the National Space Club Florida Committee's Dr. Kurt H. Debus Award. The Cape Canaveral Section congratulates him on this latest honor, and is pleased to welcome him to the Astronaut Hopeful Networking Night on March 12.

Panel Discussion on Space Policy and Economic Development

One of the Space Policy topics discussed during the event was Congressman Bill Posey’s Amendment to the SPACE Act (H.R. 2262) that streamlines regulatory processes, encourages cooperation between government agencies and eliminates red tape of the commercial space sector.

Another talking point involved Economic Developments in Commercial Space Activity, where we learned about manufacturing in zero G, including 3D Printing of human organs and pharmaceuticals.

Interest was also piqued over the Mobile Launcher for Moon Missions. The legacy Mobile Launch Platforms that carried the Saturn-V are being modified to support the new Space Launch System (SLS) Expendable Launch Vehicles that will carry astronauts back to the Moon and on to Mars.

AIAA and the AIAA Space Systems Technical Committee (SSTC) are seeking participants in the 2020 SSTC Student Essay Contest. The contest is open to any seventh or eighth grader (or equivalent). If you know a middle school student who is interested, please encourage them to write an essay and apply!

Theme:

“How advanced can you envision space technology and exploration through the next 50 years? What do we need to do NOW to achieve that?”

Requirements:

- Typewritten essay, double-spaced, Times New Roman, 12 pt. font, in 1,000 words or less
- Include student name, teacher name, grade, and school name printed at the top of the essay
- Submit essay to Melissa Sleeper, scicrzy@gmail.com or melissa.sleeper@indianriverschools.org, with student and teacher's name, phone, e-mail, and mailing address for notification and awards, in the body of the email.

Judging Criteria:

1. Originality of ideas presented
2. Soundness of logic used to develop ideas
3. Realism of ideas presented
4. Quality of composition and clarity of expression

National Prizes:

1st place will be awarded \$125, 2nd place will be awarded \$75, and 3rd place will be awarded \$50. Winners are publicly announced in the September issue of Aerospace America magazine.

Eligibility:

Any seventh or eighth grader (or equivalent).

Deadline:

Final submission deadline to Melissa Sleeper, K-12 STEM Officer, Cape Canaveral Section, is **March 31, 2020**. Local winners and their teachers will be notified in April. National winners and their teachers will be notified in May.
