July History Corner with Dave McGrath

- On July 4, 1997, the Mars Pathfinder lander and Sojourner rover touched down on Mars after a six month journey. Elkton built the retros and airbag inflators. ILC Dover built the airbag system around the inflators. A huge success for Delaware section members!
- On July 15, 1975 the final Apollo mission was launched for the Apollo-Soyuz mission. This mission, like all others in the Apollo program was supported by Elkton-made rocket motors.
- On July 4, 1968 a Delta 1913 vehicle with a STAR 37D third stage (modified from the Surveyor program) and a STAR 17 upper stage for the NASA Goddard Radio Astronomy Explorer was launched.
- And of course, on July 16, 1969 Apollo 11 was launched from Cape Canaveral for the historic Moon Landing a few days later aided by 13 Elkton-made solid rockets. "Hard to believe it was 54 years ago when I watched it all on a 19 inch black and white TV. Little did I know then that I would meet Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin in the course of my career and that I would work at Elkton where support of the Saturn V was a large program."


