

As of April 1, 2012, there were 26,805 professional AIAA members of whom 4,024 were international members. There are also 3,918 Educator Associate Members and 7,085 student members. There are 97 corporate members (including ATK) of which 12 are International companies. There are 66 technical committees. PURDUE UNIVERSITY DESIGN COMPETITION

This past spring members from the AIAA Delaware section acted as judges for a design competition held every semester at Purdue University. Aeronautical and astronautical engineering students are required to take AAE 251: Introduction to Aerospace Design. This course teaches the students the fundamentals of design, the importance of written and oral communication and how to work in a team. The students demonstrate these skills through their final project. The students are given a request for proposal that requires them to design an aircraft and a rocket that will meet their customer's needs. Their final design is presented in a written report as well as a presentation to their classmates. This project is much more than a grade to these students though, it is a source of pride. The professor instructing this course sends the top reports to Purdue alumni to review and rank. The reports are graded based on their technical content and the team's ability to communicate their design. The judges evaluated four teams on the efficiency, success and use of engineering principals in the design as well as the team's professionalism, organization and appropriateness of the report.

BOHEMIA MANOR CAREER DAY

On Thursday, May 17th, Bohemia Manor Middle School held their first career day, which the AIAA Delaware Section supported. The career day was open to all 8th grade students. The students selected four different 30 minute workshops to attend, each highlighting a different field. During the last 30 minutes of the morning the students were invited to visit the various classrooms during a "gallery walk" to allow them to discuss careers with professionals whose workshop they were not able to attend. STEM officer Breanne Wooten attended the career day as a representative for the field of engineering. The students were given a quick rocket motor introduction during the workshop, shown videos of the various programs one might work on in the aerospace industry, and given advice for classes and activities to participate in during high school to enhance their STEM experience. Approximately 50 students participated in the workshops, with another 10-15 visiting during the gallery walk, including all the participants from this year's Introduce a Girl to Engineering Day!

ROCKETS FOR SCHOOLS PROGRAM

This year was the 16th annual Rockets for School (RFS) program sponsored by the Delaware Aerospace Education Foundation (DASEF). The event was held at Cape Henlopen State Park in Lewes, DE on Saturday, May 5, 2012. AIAA-DE section supported the event to run a display booth and to provide award and contest prize money for the event. The categories that received prizes were: Design a Logo, Canister Rocket, Balloon Lifting, Bottle Rocket, Single Stage Rocket, and Advanced Rocket.

RFS is a hands-on learning program, developed by DASEF, which seeks to educate children on the importance of science and technology and stimulate academic interest and public awarenessin engineering, math, technology, space, and environmental sciences.

Rockets designed and built by K-12 students in Delaware-area schools were on exhibit for all tosee, and were launched throughout the day from the designated high powered launch areas. Canister rockets, constructed from 35-mm film canisters with an antacid-water propellantcombination, were launched inside of the event exhibit tent. Bottle rockets using water and pressurized air for fuel, constructed from 2-liter soda bottles, were

pressurized and launched on the event field site. Single-stage rockets, splashed with each team's personalized logo, were launched on the event field site and recoveredby the Civil Air Patrol (CAP). Advanced rockets, with a personalized paint job and payload, wereon display inside of the event tent but were not launched due to low cloud cover.

The Delaware AIAA Section set up a display booth in conjunction with ATK Tactical Propulsionand Controls Division, Elkton Operations. Taylor Donaldson, Education Chair, helped answer questions about AIAA and rockets along with ATK representative Anthony LoRusso, and distributed prize money to the winners of each rocket category.

The Delaware Aerospace Education Department (in conjunction with the Delaware Teacher Center) provides high quality, aerospace educational programs and outreach science/math/technology activities to K-12 students throughout Delaware. These activities provide highly motivating and interdisciplinary opportunities for students to learn about science-based life skills and non-traditional career choices. DASEF is a non-profit organization that conducts the summer Delaware Aerospace Academies and other AeroTech educational support programs and outreach that serve as a framework for educating, exciting and motivating students.

Special Note: Please include your AIAA Membership Number information on the ballot. The Membership number is the number found on your Aerospace America magazine label or your AIAA membership card. That number is the only means by which to verify that the ballot is valid and that any member has not voted more than once.

In accordance with the election procedure, section members may enter additional nominees for one, or all, of the section officers proposed by the nominating committee. If alternative names are presented, a written confirmation that the alternative member has agreed to serve the term of office will be required. Each petition nominee requires the support of at least 5% of the section membership. The nominee receiving a plurality of votes cast wins that office. Section members should mark and return their ballots to the Delaware Section Secretary by <u>Monday, June 18 2012</u>. The ballots can be sent to:
